Some Things Do Seem to Change –

Just look at the wild weather that has occurred this year. Three major hurricanes almost one after another have hit the US in the past two months. The US Weather Service had to add a new color to their maps to designate the amount of rainfall that fell during Harvey, as some parts of Houston saw over 60 inches of rain. Major devastation from Texas to Puerto Rico has occurred and as I write, we still have a month and a half of hurricane season to go. Move to the other side of the country and Californians were skiing in some mountain resorts up until August, as a record 510 inches of snow fell this season. But a dry summer and strong winds have created wildfires that stretch almost the entire length of California. Over 100,000 acres have burned and continue to grow. Believe what you will on climate change, but something is going on and we can only hope things will calm down going forward.

And Some Things Don't -

Having lived in Califon for nearly 30 years, 12 of which were on Academy Street, I'm sensitive to the issue of speeding in town. Two little kids and a dog on a busy street will do that. As a council member we have heard a number of requests this year from residents on Academy Street and Main Street asking for our assistance in getting motor vehicles to slow down coming through town. While it doesn't help that the center of town is at the bottom of a hill of these two streets, Council and Police Chief Almer from Washington Township have had discussions to figure out a way to get people to obey the speed limit. Although it may seem I'm preaching to the choir, it's just a gentle reminder that Main Street from the top of Route 512 to Route 513 is 25 MPH. Academy Street heading north is 30 MPH until you get to the train station where it drops to 25 MPH until it meets with Main Street. Maybe it isn't residents of Califon, but please keep in mind of our neighbors who live on these two streets. While this problem seems to have continued throughout the years, I'm hopeful we can find a way to make a change in the future.

But Some Things Change That We Wish Didn't -

Finally, some things change and unfortunately don't stay the same. After almost 18 years, Councilman Gill Smith will be leaving Borough Council. I speak for the Borough Council, the staff and professionals as well as members of our community in thanking him for his dedication and desire of making Califon a better place. During his time as a council member, Gill was Council President for as long as I can remember and oversaw various committees such as Recreation, Streets and Roads, Buildings and Grounds and was instrumental from the very beginning in putting together our annual Memorial Parade. And while he dedicated himself to Califon as a councilman, he also was a devoted leader of the local Boy Scout troop. As someone who I greatly truly respect both as a person and professionally as a councilman, willing to do what needed to be done unselfishly, he will be greatly missed on council and to the Borough of Califon. And while we all wish him well, I'm sure he will continue to be a part of the fabric of Califon one way or another.

Califon Firefighters Dominate a Local Challenge! By Mayor Charles Daniel

Recently, I participated in a local firefighter's training exercise. Actually, it was more of a 'friendly and fun' challenge put forth by Mayor Bill Roehrich of Washington Township (Morris County), stating that Washington Township's volunteer fire company, along with Mayor Roehrich's participation, could defeat Califon's volunteer fire company, joined by me, in a 'barrel' competition.

The 'barrel fight', as it is known, is a rigorous training exercise and friendly competition between local volunteer fire companies. It involves the 'hosing' of an empty aluminum barrel tethered on a cable fastened between two telephone poles, approximately 25 feet in the air and 30 yards apart. The firefighters (in teams of 3) compete by pushing the barrel in opposing directions with the force of the water coming from the hose. The team that moves the barrel to the opposing team's telephone pole wins.

A few observations:

- The hose is heavy the length of the hose, the water moving through it and the force at which the water leaves the hose can exhaust a person very quickly.
- It's dark and you can't see anything the spray of the water into the air coming from both teams obstructs the view of the barrel, such that one has to rely on the sound of water hitting the empty barrel in order to aim correctly.
- It's dangerous remember those movies where the firefighters lose their grip on the hose and the hose acts like an uncontrollable whip? It's true. The hose can seriously injure anyone in its path.

Califon's participating firefighters – Rich Bergmann, Mike Pennucci, Jack Murray, and A.J. Ader – destroyed the competition, winning every event. Congratulations!

I take away from this exercise a deeper respect and admiration for the dedication and hard work our volunteer firefighters put forth to serve Califon. It is your commitment that keeps our community safe. And, because of their victory, Califon has earned local 'bragging' rights! Thanks guys!

"Community Energy Aggregation"

Over the past few months, Borough Council has been considering establishing a Community Energy Aggregation (CEA) Program for Califon residents. The CEA Program is designed to offer you and your neighbors reduced rates on your electric bills.

Back in September of this year, Council members listened to a presentation on the savings opportunity offered to residents through participation in a CEA program by aggregating the buying power of individual residential customers within a municipality (or several municipalities) to secure reduced-rate energy supply contracts on a community-wide basis. We learned that several towns in nearby counties have joined together to form energy cooperatives: the Morris Area Energy Cooperative (comprised of 10

towns), the Sussex-Warren Cooperative (also comprised of 10 towns) and the Burlington County Energy Aggregation Program (also comprised of 10 towns). These cooperatives function very similarly to other shared services arrangements. In this case, by combining all of our residents' energy usage, we can shop for a reduced "bulk" electricity supply rate rather than each resident paying the rate set by the State for an individual account.

Basically, this program allows us – at the local level – to offer a more cost-effective alternative to our residents. The New Jersey Board of Public Utilities was in attendance for the presentation and provided information about the consumer protections offered through CEA programs versus individual third-party supply contracts. One of the primary safeguards under a CEA program is that the rate charged under the program MUST be lower than the State's default rate. This "default rate" is the rate that all of us not already in a third-party supply contract pay now for our electricity supply.

Another consumer protection with a CEA program is that the program rate is a flat, non-variable rate that is set for the term of the contract with the program's supplier. There are also no fees, fines, or penalties associated with a resident's participation – or non-participation – in the program. Residents can come and go in the program as they see fit. Initially all residents not currently in a contract with a third-party supplier or with solar panels will be included in the program, but this does not mean that a resident has to stay in the program. Residents will have several methods by which they can change their participation status in the program at any time and at no cost.

A very important point made during the presentation is that ALL current services provided by JCP&L such as delivery, meter readings, billing, payments, emergency services, etc., don't change because we join a CEA program or cooperative. Essentially, not much changes at all other than our residents receiving a smaller monthly electricity bill.

Based on what we learned during the presentation and in our discussions with other towns currently participating in a CEA program or cooperative, Borough Council decided to establish a community energy aggregation cooperative for Hunterdon County – called the Hunterdon Area Energy Cooperative – with Califon as the Lead Agent for the cooperative. As Lead Agent, the Borough of Califon will be the unified voice for all towns that decide to participate in the cooperative. Currently, Clinton and Bethlehem are in the process of considering CEA programs for their residents as well, and it is highly likely that others will follow as word spreads about the savings

opportunities.

We will keep you updated on our progress in bringing these savings to you and our neighbors in other towns in Hunterdon County.

2018 Free Rabies Clinic for Dogs and Cats

The Califon Board of Health will be sponsoring a FREE Rabies Clinic on Saturday January 13th 2018 from 1pm to 3pm at the Califon Municipal garage bays, 39 Academy St, Califon.

For rabies control purposes the NJ Dept. of Health and Senior Services recognizes the following durations of immunity for dogs and cats vaccinated with three-year rabies vaccine.

If your dog or cat is receiving its first vaccination then the rabies vaccine is good for one year. Please note your animal is not fully immunized against rabies until 28 days after the rabies vaccine has been administered. Please keep your pet indoors until this 28-day period.

NOTICE TO ALL DOG OWNERS

Dog Licenses must be obtained by January 31st. Please complete the application upon receipt of this mailing to avoid accruing late fees!

N.J. Fees as scheduled should be enclosed with your application along with a certificate of your dog's current rabies inoculation. Rabies inoculation must not expire during this year of licensing.

Two surcharge fees have been imposed by the State of N.J.- (1) N.J. Pilot Clinic Fund Surcharge of \$0.20; (2) N.J. Animal Control Population Fund Surcharge- \$3.00. Along with a copy of the rabies certificate we will also need a veterinarian's certificate, or an affidavit stating the animal has been altered. The proof of alteration only needs to be submitted the first time you are licensing your dog with Califon after the alteration takes place. Our system will store this information for future reference.
